- Won the tender to grow Dacorum Borough Council's bedding plants for the next 5 years alongside the lease to the Council's Central Nursery site in Hemel Hempstead

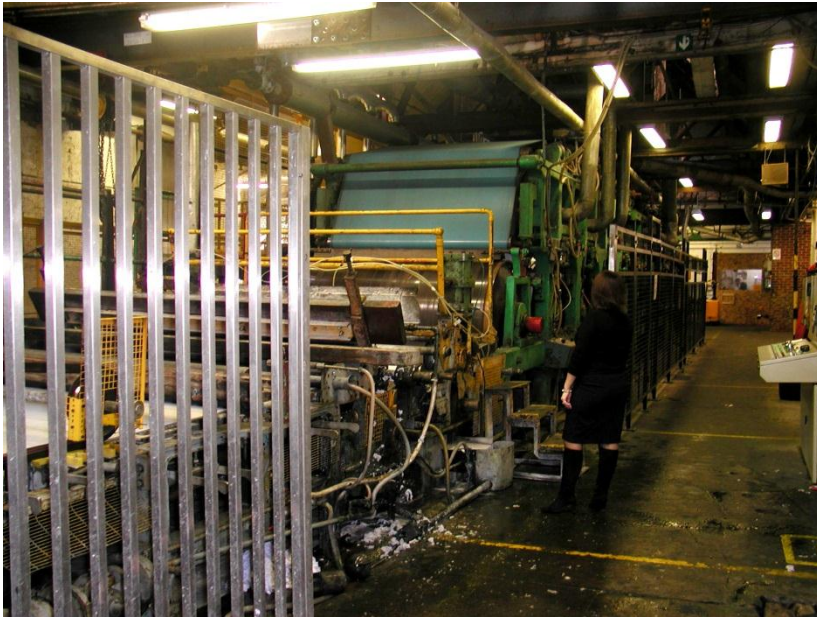
